The invited guest of honour at the event was Mr. Elijah K'Awour, a lecturer at the Catholic University campus in Kisumu. Accompanying Elijah were Robert Onyango and Joseph Wahuto, both from Catholic University. Mr. Patrick Odhiambo, the District Quality Assurance Officer (DQASO) from the Ministry of Education was also present.

Around 150 prizes were given to learners and staff to honour them for their outstanding work in the previous academic year. The various categories of excellence included: academic achievement, most improved, most organized, character, responsibility, discipline, sports, creativity and cleanliness, among others. The event was graced by entertainment from learners in each class. NMS

The description reads:

The purpose of the Scholarship Fund is to set up an initial endowment of \$2,500 to assist with tuition for indigent or needy students who otherwise would not be able to attend the Nambale Magnet School. The Fund is to be called the "Quinn Rooney Memorial Scholarship" and is to be awarded to those students or applicants demonstrating need and exhibiting either an aptitude for or special love of music. The committee may award each scholar up to \$500 for an academic year, but need not award the entire amount to every student.

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Mr. Elijah K'Awour, in his speech, compared the school to Starehe Boys Centre, which was started by the late Dr. Geoffrey Griffins. That school was started to assist boys from vulnerable backgrounds. He encouraged the stake holders to be aggressive and take a lead in education matters in the region. In addition he acknowledged that Daniel, the head teacher, is the link between NMS and the University. Daniel takes courses at the Catholic University during school holidays. Mr. Elijah proposed

that the University and School explore ways of having a business relationship.

The Founding Director, Rev. Evalyn Wakhusama articulated the school's
